The information was then stored on an encrypted disc that can only be viewed by the police department. Because some senior residents may develop illnesses such as Alzheimer's, dementia, or memory loss that may make them more susceptible to getting lost or disoriented, this extra measure of safety gives many residents and their families a greater sense of security.
